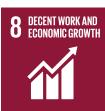

Basic Facts

- UN released the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in September 2015
- 17 goals and 169 associated targets due to be reviewed in 2030
- SDGs were a revision of the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) set by the UN in 2000 with the primary objective to reduce poverty
- New SDGs are broader in scope
- SDGs were agreed on by all UN member states, comprising of 193 countries
- UN encouraging business of all types to embrace the SDGs & find opportunities

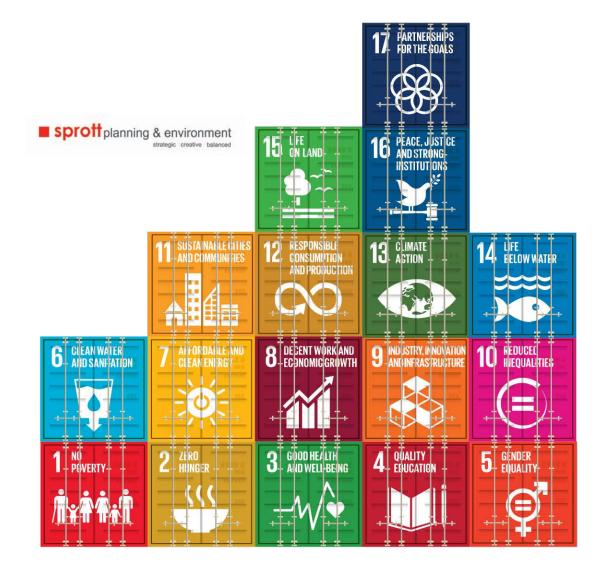

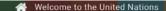

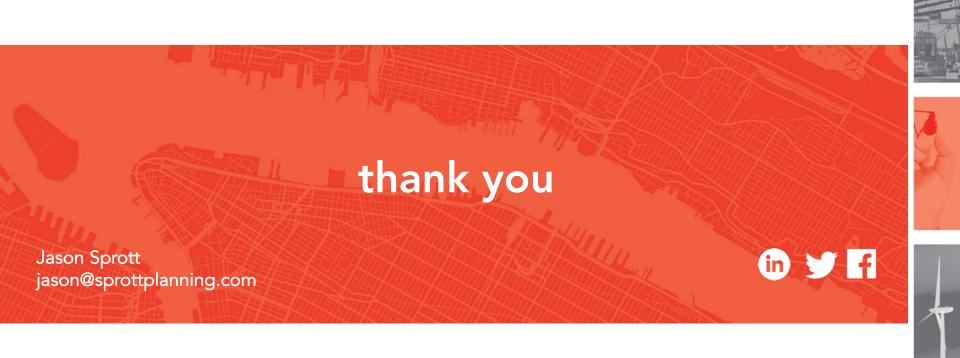

We believe we have a responsibility to make a broad positive impact in the countries and communities in which we operate. Our voluntary social investment through our operations and our contributions to the BHP Billiton Foundation (a US-based charity) is strongly aligned with a number of SDGs, including life on land, climate action, quality education, reducing inequality and enhanced institutional governance of natural resources.

Contributing to the UN **Global Goals**

Our ambitions are responding to global challenges and contributing to the new UN Sustainable Development Goals or Global Goals.

The United Nations (UN) has set clear objectives for 2030 to galvanise worldwide efforts to end poverty, promote prosperity and wellbeing, and protect the environment.

Business will play an important part in achieving these Global Goals. And we see great opportunities for BT to contribute. We took part in the Project Everyone campaign to raise awareness of the Global Goals and we're exploring how we can contribute most effectively ourselves.

Achieving the Global Goals is essential for the good of society, the environment and sustainable economic growth. If the world can't address global challenges effectively, national economies could slow down. This could have a knock-on effect on our business.

We've explored the potential impacts on our business, if the Global Goals are not achieved by 2030 in the markets where we operate. We've also looked at where the ICT industry can make the most difference, using guidance from the World Summit on the Information Society, and we've mapped our own ambitions against the Global Goals to see where we're already aligned (see graphic). We're using this analysis to see where we could do more to support the Global Goals.



Taking action on climate change

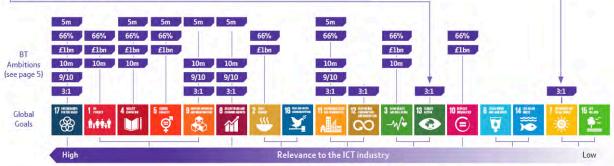
We're cutting our energy use and carbon emissions and helping our customers do the same. Our broadband lets people do more things online so they don't have to travel so much. And many of our products help businesses lower their energy use by working and collaborating remotely and storing information in the cloud. Our new BT Carbon calculator for business helps customers estimate the carbon, costs and time we could help them save.





Switching to clean energy

We're 100% behind the RE100 commitment to renewable power. We aim to use electricity from renewable sources wherever we can and this year 95% of the electricity we purchased worldwide was renewable (100% in the UK). We've also launched our 100% Sport campaign that uses the power of sport and sports stars to inspire more people to switch to clean energy.

Helping children get a good education

Our products and services are giving more people the chance to access education and improve their literacy. We aim to help 5m children receive better teaching in computing and tech skills by 2020. We're also connecting people in remote regions around the world. For example, in Kenya we've reached nearly 34,000 children as part of the Open Space Literacy campaign to give children opportunities to access education and improve their literacy.

Supporting the Sustainable Development Goals

Launched in September 2015, the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) consist of 17 ambitious goals dedicated to improving the wellbeing of present and future generations. The SDGs aim to tackle the world's most pressing challenges through the promotion of sustainable development over the next 15 years.

An estimated \$5-7 trillion a year until 2030 will be needed to realise the SDGs worldwide, including investments into infrastructure, clean energy, water and sanitation and agriculture.

During the year, the first Australian SDGs summit was held, with engagement and statements of support from a range of sectors including businesses, NGOs and academia. The Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade and Prime Minister and Cabinet are leading an ongoing process to ensure strong whole-of-government coordination on the 2030 Agenda. An appetite for collaboration across sectors towards the goals was evident through the discussion.

In 2016, building on our earlier mapping of Westpac activities to the SDGs, we publicly confirmed our support for the SDGs through a 'CEO Statement of Support' coordinated by the UNGC Network Australia. We also identified our priority SDGs - those SDGs that we can most directly influence through our business model.

As we refresh our Sustainability Strategy in 2017, we will refine our approach to the SDGs, and identify opportunities to further lift our contribution to the SDGs in partnership with other organisations. We support the definition of domestic priorities for the SDGs to collectively guide our efforts on this important journey.

SECOND YEAR IN ACCORDANCE WITH GRI G4

The Gothenburg Port Authority has issued an annual sustainability report, Sustainable Port, since 2012. This is the second time the report has been conducted in accordance with the Global Reporting Initiative (GRI) international Sustainability Reporting Guidelines (G4 Guidelines) "Core" option.

This year's sustainability report, which concerns the 2016 business year, has not been assured by a third party. However, it is our assessment that the information in this report meets the information requirements of GRI's Core option.

Unless otherwise stated, the information provided relates to the Gothenburg Port Authority. The GRI index in this document indicates where the various parts of the report can be found. Explanatory notes on the measurement and calculation methods used are provided in the summary of the relevant key figures.

HOW WE CONTRIBUTE TO THE UN'S SUSTAINABILITY GOALS

At the UN summit meeting in September 2015, world leaders adopted 17 global goals to eradicate extreme poverty, reduce inequality and injustice the world over, and solve environmental challenges. For the period from 2016 to 2030, the nations of the world have undertaken to lead the way to a sustainable and just future – Agenda 2030. The Gothenburg Port Authority also aims to contribute to this important work.

After reviewing all the targets and sub-goals, the conclusions are as follows:

- 14 of 17 goals are assessed as relevant to our operations (not goals 1, 2 and 9)
- 40 of 169 sub-goals are assessed as relevant
- Our company already works with most of the sub-goals in one way or another

In this year's sustainability report, we have therefore chosen to incorporate those UN sustainability goals on which we can have an impact and to which we can contribute.
